## The Restoration of the American Chestnut In Central Virginia

From the early 1900's to 1940's, an exotic blight attacked and killed over 4 billion American chestnut trees. American chestnut was a dominant tree species across the east and was considered as important as the oaks we have today. The American Chestnut Foundation is nearly 30 years into its efforts

to produce a blight-resistant tree and restore the species to our forests.

Volunteers in Central Virginia are doing their part in the restoration process by finding surviving Americans, making controlled pollinations, planting breeding orchards, establishing restoration plantings, conducting citizen-assisted research, educating students and the general public and raising funds to support the restoration goals of the organization.

The efforts in Central Virginia have reached a level that can support, and be supported by, a **Central Virginia Chestnut Restoration Branch**. Local Foundation volunteers are holding a series of meetings to discuss our efforts, and to start the formation of the Branch. Come learn how you can be a part of this new chestnut effort!
